



Sustainable Development Goals:

An overview of targets and indicators from a gender perspective

This document has been prepared by the Gender Team in the UNDP Istanbul Regional Hub. It is organized in three parts.

The first section provides an overview of all targets and indicators in the SDGs that are explicitly aimed at advancing gender equality. These are targets and indicators aimed at achieving and measuring progress towards gender equality over time.

Section II highlights gender-sensitive SDG targets and indicators aimed at achieving and measuring progress towards a particular development objective and paying attention to changes over time in the status of men and women, e.g., levels of poverty disaggregated by sex, age.

Section III presents key targets and indicators that have great potential to advance gender equality if they pay attention to the differential impacts on women and men, boys and girls, through for example data disaggregation by sex and age. Specific indicators that need to disaggregate data by sex and age are highlighted in italics.

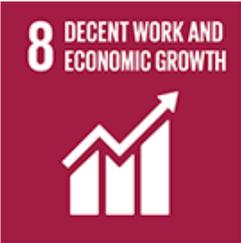
